

The Psalmodikon and I had a great time again this July 28-30, demonstrating and performing during the Nordic Fest in Decorah, Iowa. I was so pleased when Sonja Olson of Anoka came and relieved me while demonstrating in the Bethania Church, on Friday afternoon. She had a delightful time doing so and I appreciated the break.

I am so pleased to hear recently of several other Psalmodikon players who feel comfortable enough playing the Psalmodikon and have been participating in programs. Namely, Jean Akre, Portland, OR, Sonja Olson, Anoka, MN, Olive Forbord, Benson, MN, Lydia droegemueller, Plymouth, MN, and the Foslien family. Recently I have had the privilege of practising with three members of the Foslien family every Tuesday afternoon. They were tuning up for their Family Reunion in August. Perhaps you recall the story of how Nola Foslien, Brandon, MN, took the old family Psalmodikon to the family reunion auction four years ago? Floyd Foslien of Hudson, WI, her nephew, was the highest bidder. Each year since then, he has made a Psalmodikon to put up for bid at the auction. The Psalmodikon at this year's reunion was sold to the highest bid of \$490.00!! Thanks to you folks, who contribute in so many different ways. We know the history and music of the Psalmodikon will not be forgotten.

The video "How to Play the Psalmodikon" has finally been completed and is now on the market. I have been working on that production since I returned from Florida last March. It was a lot of fun but became a long and costly project. The first part tells the history of the Psalmodikon, how to tune the instrument and then how to play using the bow or plectrum. Followed by several songs to play along with. They sell for \$15.00 each, plus postage and packaging.

Last May when the Psalmodikon and I were participating at a nearby festival, I got to talking to one of the visitors about music, instruments and such. He then pulled out the neatest little "plectrum" that he said he had cut from a plastic milk bottle. It works so nicely when plucking the string of the Psalmodikon. Here is a pattern, if you would like to make one for yourself.



Some time ago, I attended a music program put on by the Latvian folks here in town. One of the instruments that were played looked much like a Psalmodikon except the bridge was in the middle and it had two sheep-gut strings. It was played with a violin bow and it is called a Giga.

Bob Solum of Hawley, MN, made a Psalmodikon and also a bow for which to play it. He tells me that the bow did not play very well. So in talking to an old violin maker, was told that the hair had to go in alternating directions. His bow now produces very beautiful sounds on his Psalmodikon.

I talked to Eleanor Sandquist of Granite Falls, MN shortly after a tornado ripped through the town. I am happy to report that Eleanor and her family are thankful that they were safe in their basement and that their home had very little damage. Many of you remember Eleanor Sandquist as our host for the 1998 get together of the Nordic-American Psalmodikonforbundet in Granite Falls.

On the prestige scale, the Psalmodikon does not command the respect given, say of the guitar or the fiddle. It is down there with the likes of the ukulele.

But with the right player, the Psalmodikon produces a large range of beautiful slow melodic tunes.

That will come as no surprise to the folks gathering on the weekend of Sept. 15, 16 & 17. The Nordic-American Psalmodikonforbundet will be host to members and guests coming from all over the United States and some as far away as Norway and Sweden.

Many are already good players, others are known as Psalmodikon enthusiasts, all of whom are interested in carrying on the Scandinavian Psalmodikon tradition.

Many people love the sound made by the Psalmodikon but in terms of thinking it as a serious instrument, it is overlooked because the Psalmodikon is homemade and has limited capabilities.

On the other hand, many folks respect the Psalmodikon because it is a simple instrument and we are making the most amount of music possible on it.

This year, the year 2000, the Nordiska Psalmodikonforbundet of Norway/Sweden will be holding a 'joint' meeting with the Nordic-American Psalmodikonforbundet. The meeting will be held at the St. Andrew Lutheran Church, 13600 Technology Drive, Eden Prairie, MN on September 15, 16 & 17. This is the first time in the history of Psalmodikons that something like this has happened. The Psalmodikon group of Norway/ Sweden has been holding annual meetings for 15 years, while the American group has been in existence for four years. The Psalmodikon is a one-stringed instrument dating back to the early 1800's. It was first intended to lead the hymn singing in the country churches of Norway and Sweden that could not afford to have an organ. It became popular in the homes and schools as well. The immigrants brought their Psalmodikons with them to America and continued to play them until the early 1900's. One did not need to have any formal musical training as the Psalmodikon is played by using the Sifferskrift method (numbers).

The Nordiska Psalmodikonforbundet was celebrating their 10th Annual Meeting when Beatrice Hole of Eden Prairie, MN, made a trip to Sweden to take part in their get-together. It was a result of this meeting that prompted Beatrice to organize a group of Psalmodikon enthusiasts, here in America, in the fall

of 1997. Anyone can become a member of the Nordic-American Psalmodikonforbundet by subscribing to a Quarterly Psalmodikon Newsletter, mailed to approximately 100 members, and written by Beatrice Hole.

The Psalmodikon players will be performing for the public at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, September 17 at the Norwegian Lutheran Church, Franklin and 10th Avenue South, Minneapolis, MN. Everyone is welcome.






Psalmodikonforbundet 2000 location and directions.
